## SAFETY IN PUBLIC ASSEMBLIES

With summer approaching, we may find ourselves in a structure or outdoor event known as a “public assembly”. The definition of a public assembly and entertainment facilities are places where people congregate in large numbers to attend events. Examples

of these types of facilities include professional sports stadiums and arenas, exhibition and convention centers, assembly halls and auditoriums, movie theaters and live performance venues

Every day, millions of people wake up, go to work or school, and take part in social events. However, every so often the unexpected happens: an earthquake, a fire, a chemical spill, an act of terrorism or some other disaster. Routines change drastically, and people are suddenly aware of how fragile their lives and routines can be.

Each disaster can have lasting effects — people may

seriously injured or killed, and devastating and costly property damage can occur. People entering any public assembly building need to be prepared in case of an emergency.

### BEFORE YOU ENTER

- Take a good look. Does the building appear to be in a condition that makes you feel comfortable? Is the main entrance wide and does it open outward to allow easy exit? Is the outside area clear of materials stored against the building or blocking exits?
- Have a communication plan. Identify a relative or friend to contact in case of emergency or if you are separated from family or friends.
- Plan a meeting place. Pick a meeting place outside to meet family or friends with whom you are attending the function. If there is an emergency, be sure to meet them there.

### WHEN YOU ENTER

- Take a good look and locate exits immediately. When you enter a building, you should look for all available exits. Some exits may be in front and some behind you. Be prepared to use your closest exit. You may not be able to use the main exit.
- Check for clear exit paths. Make sure aisles are wide enough and not obstructed by chairs or furniture. Check to make sure your exit door is not blocked or chained. If there are not at least two exits or exit paths are blocked, report the violation to management and leave the building if it is not immediately addressed. Call the local fire inspector to register a complaint.
- Do you feel safe? Does the building appear to be overcrowded? Are there fire sources such as candles burning, cigarettes or cigars burning, pyrotechnics, or other heat sources that may make you feel unsafe? Are there safety systems in place such as alternative exits, sprinklers, and smoke alarms? Ask the management for clarification on your concerns. If you do not feel safe in the building, leave immediately. If you feel the venues overcrowded, notify the fire department immediately.

### FACT

A fire at The Station Nightclub in West Warwick, Rhode Island, on February 20, 2003, claimed 100 lives and is the fourth-deadliest nightclub fire in U.S. history. Since that fire, NFPA has enacted tough new code provisions for fire sprinklers and crowd management in nightclub type venues. Those provisions mark sweeping changes to the codes and standards governing safety in assembly occupancies.

Jackson Township’s Fire Inspectors cannot be in all the public assemblies in Jackson Township twenty-four seven. We need you to be observant and be our eyes and ears. If you see something please call and report it to the Jackson Fire Prevention Bureau at 330-834-3951 or after hours notify Regional Emergency Dispatch Center at 330-499-6666 or by dialing 9-1-1.

## JACKSON FIRE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES BWC GRANT

The risk firefighters face for developing job-related cancers is well known. According to the Firefighter Cancer Support Network, 61 percent of line of duty deaths for career firefighters between 2002 and 2016 were attributed to cancers. The Ohio Bureau of Workers’ Compensation (BWC) has initiated a grant program to assist fire departments across Ohio with trying to reduce the cancer rates among firefighters. The Jackson Fire Department received a grant from the BWC under the new program aimed at reducing firefighter exposure to carcinogens and other toxic elements. The fire department received the grant in the amount of \$14,000 to purchase

four fire gear washing machines known as extractors. The fire gear extractors will be placed at fire stations 2, 3, 4 and 5. This will provide firefighters with the tools necessary to decontaminate their fire gear after each exposure. “Our first responders deserve the best tools to protect them against the dangers of fighting a fire,” said BWC Administrator/CEO Sarah Morrison. “Those dangers include toxins and carcinogens that linger on equipment after the fire is over. With these grants, firefighters across Ohio can purchase equipment that guards against these long-term dangers to their health.” With the addition of these four extractors, all Jackson fire stations now have fire gear washing capabilities.

## FILLING THE VACANCIES

On April 30, six new part-time Firefighter/EMT’s began serving the Jackson Township Fire Department.

Currently, the department is staffed by 68 career firefighter/paramedics and 4 fire safety inspectors. Twenty additional part-time positions are used to supplement staffing, as well as provide a pool of personnel to hire career members when vacancies occur due to retirements.



## SAFETY STAND-DOWN 2018 TRAINING

This event highlights critical safety, health, and survival issues for the fire and emergency services. Throughout the county, fire departments are encouraged to take two weeks in the month of June and focus all training evolutions to these subjects.

For the second year in a row, the Jackson Township Fire Department (JTFD) took on the challenge; the department covered numerous topics, including the 16 Life Safety Initiatives, the Rules of Engagement, health and wellness, as well as an in-depth review of departmental standard operational procedures related to firefighter safety issues.




**Firefighter/paramedic Gary Fogle training in a wire maze with limited visibility.**

In addition, hands-on training consisted of a wire maze with limited visibility, ladder bailouts, low-profile egress, low-air management, radio communications with emergency button activation, calling a Mayday under a stressful (controlled) environment, rescuing a downed firefighter in a commercial building, forcible entry, wall breaching, firefighter drags and carries, air trans-fill drills, waist strap conversion, and webbing use, personal and tactical accountability, and use of the Incident Command System during a Mayday or RIT scenario.

The report from the JTFD for this training was so successful that the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC) has used it as a testimonial benchmark for other fire departments across the country to strive to achieve. The members of the JTFD constantly strive to be professional and progressive; they simply are the 'best of the best'.

## SUMMER CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

- Keep doors locked at all times. If you are working in the back yard, keep your front door and garage door closed and locked; and lock your back door when you are in the front yard. Always lock your doors when you leave, even if you only plan to be gone for a few minutes.
- During the summer weather, many people open windows or sliding glass doors while they are at home. Always remember to close and lock your windows and sliding doors when you go to bed or leave the house.

- Install motion-activated lights in your front and back yards, so when someone approaches your home, the lights automatically come on, illuminating that person.

- Put all ladders and other tools back into a secure storage area after you use them. Ladders and other tools can be used by criminals to access your home. Always lock any storage unit or shed you have on your property.
- Be aware of home improvement scams. If you did not solicit the contractor or salesman who shows up at your door unannounced, do not do business with that person.
- If a utility representative comes to your house, request identification. True representatives will carry their identification and they will gladly show it to you. Call their company for verification.

- In warm weather months personal property thefts increase; there is a tendency to leave items, such as bicycles, gardening tools, lawnmowers, weed eaters, and other yard tools lying around in the open. Make sure you lock up your personal property in your garage or yard shed; it does not take long for someone to ride by and quickly take your property. An open garage door or yard shed can also be inviting, keep them closed even when you are at home.
- Always remember to roll up your car windows, take any valuables out of your car, and lock your doors every time you exit your vehicle, even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway.
- Being a good neighbor can be one of the best crime prevention tools. Watchful, attentive neighbors can identify activity that is not “normal” to their neighborhoods and alert the Police Department at 330-832-1553.


### OFFICER CHAD KANOUFF

## 2018 CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS:

Jackson will see considerable construction improvements this season. Application for grant funding will be leveraged with local match money from the road levy, gas and license taxes. Grants are a huge help with the projects and bring taxation funds back into Jackson Township.

Public competitive bidding has achieved the lowest and best pricing for the following projects in Jackson Township. Several other projects are under design and waiting for funding and coordination.

- The 2018 resurfacing contract is signed and in place for this summer for \$1,339,867 to resurface 17.13 miles of the most deserving roadways.
- Curbing replacement project has been contracted for 4,988 feet for \$164,726.
- The Jackson Township Safety Center parking and approach roadways will be leveled and resurfaced for \$70,535.60.
- Restriping will be applied to 40 miles of the busiest Township jurisdiction roadways to assist in driving safety both day and night. This contract has been awarded for \$45,973.45.
- The new Strip Avenue Extension will extend from Home Depot north to Applegrove to provide much needed additional traffic relief in the area. The project has been publicly bid and is under contract for construction completion this year.
- Dominion East Ohio and Aqua Ohio are involved in the Strip Avenue Extension project as well as numerous other smaller improvements throughout the Township.
- The Shuffel Street and Freedom Avenue intersection has a new traffic signal installed as a joint project with Jackson Township and Stark County to assist in the growing traffic from I-77.
- University Drive will be resurfaced from Dressler Road to Frank Avenue as a joint venture utilizing an OPWC grant with the Stark County Engineer along with resurfacing Dressler from Everhard Road to Whipple Avenue.
- The Stark County Engineer has contracted a major reconstruction of the busy intersection of Everhard Road and Whipple Avenue using several grants. This project will add center turn lanes in the north and east quadrants of the intersection and new eastbound and westbound drop right turn lanes on Everhard Road.
- Over the next two years, the Stark County Engineer will be resurfacing Pittsburg Avenue followed by Whipple Avenue from West Tuscarawas Street to Belden Village Avenue.
- The Stark County Sanitary Engineering Department will be reconstructing two sanitary sewer lift stations located on Island Drive and Springlake Road.
- ODOT has a contractor ready for traffic signal placement at the intersection of the Shuffel Street and I-77 on and off ramps.

## WINTER SUMMARY

This past winter season required nearly 6,000 tons of road salt, a little less than past winter operations. This reflects well on the computerized salt distribution control in the trucks, as well as, perhaps a somewhat milder winter road experience. The late spring definitely created more potholes than past winters. This has kept the highway division crews out daily finding and filling them temporarily with cold mix asphalt.

## YARD DEBRIS WASTE DROP-OFF SITE

The Jackson Township Board of Trustees was committed to reopening the yard debris waste drop-off site without the assistance and oversight of the Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Joint Solid Waste Management District. The Board of Trustees will continue to evaluate the future sustainability of the site monthly and make changes to maximize the service and keep it affordable. While the drop-off site is useful to residents, volume control of waste and the financial costs of disposing of the waste must be kept in check.

- No construction materials, no treated wood.

### RESIDENTIAL NEW CONSTRUCTION AND ADDITIONS TO YOUR PROPERTY

It's that time of year again where residents are starting construction projects on their property. When planning your projects, remember to obtain any needed approvals and permits before you begin. Zoning permits are required for most types of exterior residential construction or alterations with the exception of home repairs that do not involve structural changes. Failure to obtain the proper zoning permits can result in penalty fees in addition to the zoning permit fee. Some of the most common uses that require permits include the following:

**DETACHED ACCESSORY BUILDINGS:** A permit is required for all accessory buildings, including storage sheds that are greater than 32 sq. ft. Structures are permitted in the side and rear yard only and must be at least 15 feet from the principal building. The required minimum setback for an accessory building less than 120 sq. ft. is 5 ft. from the side and rear property line. Accessory buildings that are greater than 120 sq. ft. are required to be a minimum of 10 ft. from the side and rear property line. They are also required to be 15 ft. from the all other buildings. Any accessory buildings or structures adjacent to a secondary road right of way must maintain a 25-foot setback from the street right-of-way.

**OTHER ACCESSORY STRUCTURES:** Other accessory structures that require a zoning permit include, but is not limited to, temporary carports, swimming pools, fences, hot tubs, pergolas and arbors, gazebos, temporary storage pods, outdoor wood burning furnace, outdoor fireplace, decks, and satellite dishes greater than 25 inches in diameter or 491 square inches.

Many types of construction also require a building permit. Township residents should contact the Stark County Building Department at 330-451-1770 for information on building permits.

### RESIDENTIAL GARAGE SALE SIGNS

A permit is not required for a residential garage sale sign. However, garage sale signs shall not be posted on any utility poles and shall be a minimum of 10 ft. from the edge of pavement or curb or 5 ft. from the road right of way. Garage sale signs **must be removed** upon the conclusion of the sale.

### TEMPORARY SIGNS FOR BUSINESS USE

A temporary sign is a sign not designed for long-term use and is not permanently mounted including, but not limited to, handheld or individually carried signs. One temporary sign per business may be displayed at any one time with a temporary sign permit. Temporary sign permits shall be issued in 15 day increments. A maximum of four permits may be issued between January 1 and November 16. An additional three permits for 15 days each may be issued between November 17 and December 31 to help businesses during the holiday season. Temporary signs that are located on a building shall not be placed on the roof of any building, except those signs, which appear to be a continuation of the face of the building or a mansard roof, so long as the sign does not extend above the upper edge of the mansard roof line. Temporary signs must be a minimum of 10 ft. from the edge of pavement or curb or 5 ft. out of the road right of way.

Any temporary sign that is in violation of the zoning resolution is subject to removal by the township and disposed of at the township's discretion.



# RIPARIAN CORRIDOR SETBACKS



The purpose of a riparian setback is to control land use activities and new development within certain distances of streams, rivers and creeks. Setting development back maintains the ability of riparian areas to control flooding, limit stream bank erosion, protect habitat, purify ground water, and reduce water pollution.

Riparian setbacks are required along watercourses such as the Tuscarawas River, Ohio Erie Canal, Mudbrook Creek and the Nimisila Creek. Riparian setback on designated watercourses are as follows:

1. A minimum of 50 ft. on each side of the Tuscarawas River.
2. A minimum of 25 ft. on each side of the Mudbrook Creek, Nimisila Creek and the Ohio Erie Canal.
