

A Combined Effort for Snow and Ice Control

Each winter, our Highway Division prepares to keep our township roads safe. This has been a work in progress and is altered each season with new roads being taken over due to the new developments added. This year alone, the Township has added an additional 1.492 miles, bringing the total to 207.724 miles maintained by the Township. Jackson Township ranks second in miles for townships within the state of Ohio, only behind West Chester Township's 225 miles maintained.

The Highway Division is not the only division within the Public Works Department that addresses the snow and ice that impede our daily travels during weather related events. The Central Maintenance and Parks and Recreation Divisions assist in snow operations, as well. Jackson Township has the ability to place 28 vehicles into service when a snow and ice event occurs. Our fleet consists of 19 large salt trucks, three one-ton dump trucks, three maintenance pickup trucks, and three Parks and Recreation pickup trucks.

During an average storm event the Township is separated into sixteen different routes that include our main roads and allotments. Each route is assigned

to one of our fifteen full-time Highway Division staff and three full-time Parks and Recreation Division staff. We also have one or two staff members who help keep our mains open and assist with any issues that may arise.

Our Central Maintenance Division, which consists of a superintendent, three mechanics, three building maintenance personnel and one laborer address the Safety Center (Police and Fire Station 1), and the four outlying Fire Stations, Township Hall and the Public Works Maintenance Facility. The Central Maintenance employees are also responsible for repair and maintenance on any of the plow trucks that break down and ensure we can place them back in service as quickly as possible.



The remainder of the Parks and Recreation Division employees take care of the walking path, along with the four parking lots in North Park, the four parking lots and the ring road in South Park, Fisher Park and Stuhldreher Park. However, these additional employees within the Parks and Recreation Division assist our Highway Division during large events with the plowing of cul-de-sacs and smaller sections of roadways.

In all, each of the routes average two and a half hours to salt and five to six hours to salt and plow. During these larger events we have experienced this season, our staff continues to battle the elements between our neighborhoods and our main roads within their routes. As the snow continues to fall, they may be required to leave the neighborhoods to ensure the main thoroughfares are open.

The importance of keeping the “mains” open is not only for our residents’ travel, but to ensure our safety forces can reach an emergency safely. During larger storm events, all of our departments are in constant communication with one another to ensure the safety of our residents is a top priority.





Firefighter of the Year

The *Firefighter of the Year* award is presented to an individual firefighter/paramedic who best exemplifies positive characteristics as a member of the Jackson Township Fire Department and who also has a notable record of service and achievements. Some attributes of *Firefighter of the Year* are ability to show great compassion, fast and sound decision-making skills and courage. We are honored to have presented this award to a very well deserving member of our department, B-Shift Firefighter John Terranova.

To outline a specific call that has risen above the rest, Firefighter Terranova is recognized for actions that took place on October 13, 2021.

He was on Medic 4 when they were called to The JOANN Fabric and Craft Store for a female with difficulty breathing. Upon arrival, the patient was found pulseless and lying unresponsive on the floor with agonal respirations. Immediate high quality CPR was performed and life saving measures were given. The patient was also found to be in a lethal heart rhythm, and was immediately successfully defibrillated. Shortly after, the patient began to breathe on her own, and was transported to a local hospital for continued care. This patient is alive and well today.

As we all know this is a special occasion and reason for joy. As EMS professionals we don't often see the results of our care; specifically cardiac arrest victims. Patricia, the cardiac arrest survivor, joined us at the Firefighter of the Year award event.

Seeing the impact on those we care for that we make an effort on each day, is a true heart-warming reminder of why we do what we do.

Seasonal Safety Messages

Tornado Safety

As the severe weather season approaches, take some time during the *Spring Severe Weather Awareness Week*, March 20 through March 26, to put together a safety plan with your family, friends or household. Planning ahead will lower the chance of injury or death in the event that severe weather, such as a tornado, strikes.

Ensure that everyone knows the signs of a tornado, including a rotating, funnel-shaped cloud, an approaching cloud of debris, or a loud roar – similar to a freight train. Pay attention to the weather and to weather reports. Related severe thunderstorms can produce heavy rains, flash flooding and hail.

The National Weather Service confirmed that Ohio had 20 tornadoes in 2020. Seventeen of those tornadoes occurred during the April-May-June months. No injuries or fatalities were reported.

Know the difference between a Tornado Watch and a Tornado Warning.

- Tornado Watch means a tornado is possible. Stay tuned to your local radio station or television for weather updates. Know where you'll shelter, if necessary.
- Tornado Warning means a tornado is happening or imminent. Take shelter immediately.




Photo of the EF-1 tornado in the Lake Cable area on October 21, 2021.

Tornado Safety *continued*

Listen to NOAA Weather Radio or to your local radio or television stations for the latest weather and safety information. In any emergency, always listen to the instructions given by local emergency management officials.

Move to an underground shelter, basement or safe room. If none is available, a small, windowless interior room or hallway on the lowest level of a sturdy building is the safest alternative.

Take additional cover by shielding your head and neck with your arms and putting materials such as furniture and blankets around you.

A National Weather Service assessment identified that the tornadic activity which occurred on October 21, 2021 in Jackson Township was an EF-1 tornado. It developed around 5:10 p.m. and initially touched down near Jackson's North Park, damaged trees, recreational buildings and a large Township garage. As the tornado continued east, it damaged a business along Wales Avenue NW. The tornado continued into a neighborhood, producing intermittent tree damage all the way to Lake Cable. It crossed the lake and produced minor damage near Stark State College before dissipating near Interstate 77.

Flood Safety

Floods can happen everywhere, making them one of the country's most common natural disasters. Flooding poses a greater threat in low-lying areas, near water and downstream from dams.

Even the smallest streams, creek beds or drains can overflow and create flooding. During periods of heavy rain or extended periods of steady rains, be aware of the possibility of a flood. Flash floods develop quickly—anywhere from a few minutes to a few hours. Listen to local weather reports for flooding information.



Fire Hydrant Visibility

In order to provide efficient fire protection for you and your neighbors, the Jackson Township Fire Department rely on easily found and accessible fire hydrants for water supply. Quickly finding and accessing these hydrants in the event of an emergency is critical and can mean the difference between a little or a lot of property loss. When fire department personnel respond to put out a structure fire, the fire engines carry enough water to make an initial fire attack, but they soon need a continuous water supply from a fire hydrant to extinguish some fires. This is why finding and connecting to a fire hydrant is one of the firefighters' first priorities. GPS mapping technology on fire engines have enhanced firefighters' ability to locate hydrant locations more quickly, but getting to them when they are shrouded in shrubs, blocked by cars or covered in snow can be a challenge. This is where the public can help. Your assistance is needed in helping keep the hydrants clear of obstacles.

1. Keep at least 3 feet of clearance around the circumference of fire hydrants at all times.
2. The center of the largest opening must be at least 18 inches above the ground.
3. Keep it clear year round. Keep vehicles, grass, bushes, fencing, tree branches, weeds, snow and other obstacles away from the hydrant to allow for rapid location and easy access for firefighters.



SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

This season has been eventful within the Public Works Department. All three divisions (Central Maintenance, Highway and Parks) have worked hard at keeping the Township safe for not only the motorist with the amount of snow and ice that we have received, but they have also dealt with some unusual items over the past few months.

The Southeast corner of Township Hall was struck during an accident at the intersection of Mudbrook Street and SR241 (Wales Avenue) and a tornado touched down and did significant damage to the Highway garage and both North Park and Fisher Park just to name a few. However, the employees from all three divisions jumped into action and assisted with cleanup both within Township property, as well as some of the allotments in the line of this storm.

As it relates to the snow events we have gone through this season, the end of 2021 was pretty mild, but as the calendar turned the snow events increased. During the Martin Luther King Day weekend, the estimated two day snow fall resulted in a total of 13.6 inches of snow, which is the seventh largest two-day snowfall in the Canton/Akron Airport region's history.

We would like to thank all our drivers within each division for the work they put in during all of the snow events.

PROJECTS IN 2022

- The Township will be continuing to work with Stark County on the following projects this upcoming year:
 - Frank Avenue signalizations at the intersections of Frank Avenue/Eastlake and Frank Avenue/Strausser.
 - Continued work on Portage from Frank Avenue to just east of 77.
- The Townships joint project with the Ohio Department of Transportation should be wrapping up the completion of Phase I widening between Brunnerdale and Governors Avenue this spring.
- The Township Board of Trustees have approved the Highway Division to move forward with the Community Park Streetscape project which will replace all the existing light poles to match the light poles located on SR241 (Wales Road) and sections of Fulton Drive.
- The contracts for resurfacing, curb replacement & striping will be placed out for bid this spring. Below are the 2022 budgeted amounts for each project:
 - Resurfacing - \$1.5 million
 - Curbing - \$200,000
 - Striping - \$60,000

By having the setbacks confirmed prior to finishing the project, this ensures the structure complies with the issued permit. Property lines should be marked to help with setback verification.



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
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Parks and Recreation Division - 2021 A Year in Review

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITY

The Jackson Township Parks hosted many events last year and we are very happy to say these events were very well attended. An estimated 80,000 children and adults attended special events and recreation programs offered through the Jackson Township Parks. An estimated 25,000 children and adults visited the parks through youth sports programs, schools, churches and organizations for a total estimated visitor count of 105,000. These events and programs could not have happened without the help of the many volunteers and sponsors from the community, and we would like to thank you.

Although we experienced a destructive Tornado in October 2021, we have worked with our insurance company and the repairs and some upgrades have already been completed. The Gazebo located on the deck at the pond has received a new shake shingle roof and the softball / baseball fields are being rebuilt.

JACKSON PARKS AND PARK HOURS

We are now operating on our spring and summer hours. The North Park is open from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., through the month of November. South Park, Joseph E. Fisher Park, Edward and Mary Zink Park, Crystal Springs Bridge Park, Stuhldreher Street Fields, and Strausser Elementary Park are open one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

REMEMBER TO CONTROL YOUR PET WITH A LEASH & CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR PET.



Pets are permitted in all parks EXCEPT the North Park.

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JACKSON TOWNSHIP PARK FACILITIES CONSIST OF 8 PARKS AND APPROXIMATELY 282 ACRES

North Park: This is a beautiful 70-acre complex located at 7660 Fulton Road N.W. (across from Jackson High School). North Park features a picnic pavilion, restrooms, fully accessible playground, 1.1 mile paved walking track, seven athletic fields used for baseball, softball, soccer and lacrosse, a multi-use track used for skating and bicycling, six tennis courts, four basketball courts and two sand volleyball courts. There is also a stocked, 1½-acre fishing pond with a boardwalk and gazebo. Pets are prohibited at the North Park.

South Park: Located at 4811 South Park Drive N.W. (next to Jackson High School). South Park includes the Jackson Bog State Nature Preserve. There are two miles of hiking trails that are accessible to the public. Trails leading through the State Nature Preserve offer a rare look into the pristine habitats of hundreds of plants that have survived the ice age. In addition to the diverse plant and wildlife environment, this 95-acre complex offers two picnic pavilions and restrooms, a playground, a sand volleyball court, horseshoe pit, seven ball fields, four soccer fields, two midget football fields, six flag football fields and a concession stand. The South Park is also the home of the park maintenance facility.

Joseph E. Fisher Park: Established in 1989, this park is located at 5819 Lake O'Springs Avenue. The park has increased in size from 9 acres to 27 acres thanks to the generosity of East Ohio Gas in 1997. There are four soccer fields, five ball fields, a playground, a picnic pavilion and restrooms located on the property.

Crystal Springs Bridge Park: The Bridge across the Tuscarawas River at this site was destroyed by the 1913 flood. A temporary swinging

bridge forced the Crystal Springs residents to cross the river at great risk. In 1914 a new bridge was erected with a wooden floor that was replaced by iron grid in the 1940's. In 1995 when the Stark County Commissioners vacated this bridge, the Jackson Township Historical Society intervened to save it, and as a result the Jackson Township Trustees assumed responsibility for this bridge. In 1996 the bridge and road easement were formally dedicated as the Crystal Springs Bridge Park. Visitors can also enjoy a scenic hike or casual bicycle ride along the historic Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath.

Edward and Mary Zink Park: Located at the intersection of 38th and Michael Street, this ¾-acre mini-park was donated to the Township in 1998 to encourage beautification projects.

Stuhldreher Street Fields: Stuhldreher Street Fields, which consist of approximately 11 acres, are located at Stuhldreher Street near the intersection of Perry Drive and Hills & Dales Road. Acquired in 1998, this Jackson Park offers two large soccer fields with adjacent parking.

Strausser Elementary Park: This Park was acquired through a land lease with the Jackson Local Schools Board of Education. The park consists of three small soccer fields and two full size multipurpose fields for lacrosse or football.

Kirk Schuring Park: The township has ownership of 40 acres located at the former Hills and Dales golf course which will be used for active recreation. The property is being designed for a Sports complex, and will provide direct linkage to Stark Parks and a retail area.

Check-in will begin at 7:30 a.m. Ages 15 and under are invited to participate in this fun and exciting event. Children should bring their own poles and bait and try to catch one of the many fish stocked especially for this event. There will be special

events held throughout the day that the children can participate in. All children must be accompanied by an adult at all times. After 10:00 a.m. adults can try their luck at fishing.
