1	MR. HAWKE: It's 5:00. I'm going to go
2	ahead and call this joint session to order
3	between the Jackson Township Board of
4	Trustees and North Canton City Council for
5	October 17, 2023.
6	President Stroia, I believe you have got
7	your roll call to do.
8	MR. STROIA: Yeah. Ben, would you call
9	the roll for us, please?
10	MR. YOUNG: Member McCleaster.
11	MR. MCCLEASTER: Here.

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1 will ask, Mr. Gonzalez, will you call our roll, please? 2 3 MR. GONZALEZ: Mr. Hawke. MR. HAWKE: Here. 4 5 MR. GONZALEZ: Mr. Hardesty. MR. HARDESTY: 6 Here. 7 MR. GONZALEZ: Mr. Pizzino. MR. PIZZINO: Here. 8 9 MR. HAWKE: All right. If you would, silence all your cell phones and join us for 10 11 the Pledge of Allegiance. 12 (Whereupon, the Pledge of Allegiance is 13 recited.) 14 MR. HAWKE: As we open this hearing, I'm 15 just going to remind everybody in the audience, for anyone who wishes to speak, we 16 17 are going to follow our public speaks operational quidelines, meaning everybody 18 will be limited to a maximum of five minutes 19 to speak from the public side of that. 20 21 And with that, I'm actually going to turn 22 this over to Mr. Gonzalez and Mr. DeOrio to 23 give kind of a quick overview and briefing of 24 what the agreement is. 25 MR. GONZALEZ: Go ahead, Pat.

1	MR. DEORIO: Sure. All right. Well,
2	thank you for the opportunity to speak before
3	the board, and for this historic and
4	momentous occasion. I think this, you know,
5	journey between the two cities between the
6	City and the Township has been one that has
7	been ongoing for some time.
8	And, you know, I think that you know,
9	for me, anyhow, and I think for the City of
10	North Canton, we can answer that that U2
11	song, "We found what we were looking for."
12	And that is a partner, a partner that will
13	that we can work with together for the
14	betterment of both communities.
15	We know that there are things that we
16	have had to discuss in here that weren't easy
17	and took a long time for both sides to go
18	back and forth to figure it out. So it
19	wasn't something that was hastily entered
20	into. It took six to seven months of
21	negotiations to get us to this point.
22	But I think what we have is a fair
23	representation of each side's point of view
24	on this. And so, you know, of the you
25	know, I think when Randy and I started, this

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1 was maybe two pages long, and then we know 2 what happens from there, and it turned into something much longer. But the guts of it is 3 still essentially this, is that, you know, by 4 5 partnering together, we think that each --6 each side can get from the other something of 7 benefit. 8 So for the Township, you know, to put 9 them in a position where if we can develop 10 property together, where the Township is not 11 harmed, where the Township has the 12 opportunity to enjoy, you know, higher 13 property tax valuations from properties that 14 we would develop. 15 But it allows us to be -- allows the City to be in the lead role where we can direct 16 17 the type of development that we want. We are interested in, of course, a particular type 18 19 of thing. We were interested in something that creates income tax revenue for us. 20 21 So I think from that point, we worked out 22 all the different things that could come up 23 along the way, and -- and we like that it's 24 a -- you know, we call it a shared 25 development agreement.

1 The Township for, you know, receiving and 2 maintaining its property tax and future property taxes is taking on a portion of the 3 4 services that are to be provided, similar to 5 what they have today. 6 And the City, for -- for us and what we 7 get out of it, we'll take over a portion of those services. And that's all spelled out 8 9 in the agreement. And I think it works for both sides. 10 11 MR. GONZALEZ: I think from the 12 Township's perspective, the easiest way is to 13 take one and show you how it would work. 14 North Canton has purchased -- North Canton 15 CIC has purchased some land in Jackson Township. So from the Township's 16 17 perspective, annexation was always a bad thing, because we lost our tax base. 18 19 The way that Pat and I have come up with 20 this, and -- and I kind of kid about the 21 attorneys. I think we all did. But they are 22 the ones that are keeping us doing this 23 correctly. And they were very helpful 24 through the process. And we do want to 25 welcome North Canton over here today. It's

really momentous that you guys would be here, 1 2 and we appreciate that. 3 But if we took one, a piece of property that North Canton decided they wanted to 4 5 develop, Pat and I discussed what's the 6 importance. Of course, they need to expand 7 their borders. They need to create jobs and keep their City growing. And this gives them 8 9 the opportunity to do that. And how does that affect Jackson? 10 Well, 11 they are annexing land in Jackson Township, 12 but they are not taking it into another 13 township. It will remain in Jackson 14 It will be like it's still there. Township. 15 It will still get all the property taxes. We'll still provide all the services. 16 So it 17 will be patrolled by the police. It will be handled by our fire department. And all 18 19 those taxes that were voted on will still 20 come into the Township to help pay for all 21 those. 22 And Canton -- North Canton has the 23 opportunity then to create those jobs and 24 pick up the income tax from that. 25 It's a great -- and the other thing

1 that's kind of an off-chute of this, is there 2 have been water problems over the years. You know, whether it was used as annexation, not 3 used as annexation, this kind of sets all of 4 5 that aside, and it gives us the chance to 6 actually get water to people -- more people 7 at a better rate and not get into the -- the wars of the water. That kind of sets that 8 aside. 9 10 I believe it's -- I got a joke with 11 I said we are sitting here today and Daryl. 12 taking a picture with us. Maybe we should 13 send this to the Middle East. 14 But I think you are going to see tonight, 15 and I think it's important that both parties, with everything that we are watching, this 16 17 has really not become a political event at all. It has been something that is the best 18 19 for our residents and the residents of North 20 Canton. 21 MAYOR WILDER: Yes, sir. 22 MR. HAWKE: Well, with that, I mean, 23 we'll reserve our discussion and topics until 24 We'll go ahead and open the hearing the end. 25 for anybody from the public who would like to

1 speak in support of the agreement, if anybody 2 has anything to say from that side. 3 (No response.) 4 MR. HAWKE: Nothing? This was published. 5 I know North Canton had it on their website. 6 So this was out there for folks to read and 7 see, available from that perspective from a public review. 8 9 So with that, we'll close that segment of 10 the hearing for support. And we'll go to 11 anyone from the public who has opposition for 12 the agreement. 13 Go ahead. You have five minutes. State 14 your name and address for the record, just so 15 we know where you are at. MR. OSBORNE: Chuck Osborne, 307 Fairview 16 17 Street, Southeast, North Canton, Ohio. Ι don't know how many years it has been --18 19 nine, ten years. It has been quite a 20 while -- I spoke up here on this same topic, 21 probably this very same spot. 22 I am very much alarmed and disappointed 23 with this seemingly rushed-through, 24 steamrolled idea. North Canton is just trying to survive. We are built out. 25 And

1 all cities or villages grow with annexations. 2 There is no legal reason why this can't be a clean, total annexation. I don't think 3 4 we have to worry about Jackson Township 5 surviving. I haven't looked at the stats, 6 but how many square miles is in Jackson 7 Township? You are continuing to grow. You are not going to be harmed irretrievably with 8 a clean, total annexation. 9 It's my understanding you will continue 10 11 to collect property taxes as state law allows 12 under expedited annexations, whatever you 13 want to call this, that will continue things 14 for about 12 years. 15 Fifty years, your children, your grandchildren will never see the end of this 16 17 50-year agreement. It doesn't make sense. Ι quess we'll have to start calling that area 18 19 of North Canton East Jackson. 20 North Canton can't survive. And this 21 sets a precedence. Any future annexations by 2.2 either Plain -- from Plain or Jack -- or Lake are going to have the same expectations. 23 24 I don't know why a community that has 25 slowly eat out of existence with annexations

1 would contemplate this step at all. In my 22 2 years of activism -- the first two years as a Council member -- over that time span, I have 3 4 heard on occasion Council members speak out 5 of the missteps by North Canton City 6 government. 7 Why didn't we annexation -- annex Belden 8 Village years and years ago? I guess people 9 thought they'd put all of our eggs in one basket -- how much time do I've got? 10 I don't 11 have a clock. 12 MR. HAWKE: You are about two minutes. 13 I'll give you the one-minute warning. 14 MR. OSBORNE: Why we didn't annex Belden 15 Village. I guess they were fat, dumb, and happy thinking we've got a big Fortune 500 16 17 company in North Canton, and that will continue until the end of time. Well, we 18 19 have seen that didn't last. 20 So Jackson Township will not be harmed at 21 all. You're -- you're growing by leaps and 22 bounds. You just got the -- the latest development. I can't think of the name at 23 24 the moment. Costco. And many others. You 25 have got vast acreage to grow. And why you

1	would hold over North Canton City officials
2	that we are going to quibble over this small
3	expansion to the west, I don't understand
4	that.
5	This sets a precedent and North Canton
б	will not exist if this kind of agreement
7	exists and continues. Thank you very much.
8	MR. HAWKE: Thank you. Anyone else
9	wishing to speak in opposition of the
10	agreement?
11	(No response.)
12	MR. HAWKE: Okay. Then I will close
13	the close that section of the hearing.
14	And I will open it for discussion from the
15	bodies from both North Canton City Council,
16	as well as the Board of Trustees from Jackson
17	Township. And the Mayor. Sorry. I guess
18	you are technically not on the Council.
19	MAYOR WILDER: Does anybody from
20	Council like to go first?
21	MR. REVOLDT: Mayor, we'll defer to you
22	first.
23	MAYOR WILDER: Okay. Thank you for the
24	honor. I do have shared comments. First of
25	all, thank you again for the invitation to be

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1 here and for the opportunity to work for the 2 benefit of our communities. I'd like to preface something from our 3 master plan, if I may. Purpose and scope. 4 5 For the last year or so, we have been 6 developing a master plan for the City. Ιt 7 has been adopted by our City Council. But I 8 just want to give you a short paragraph, and 9 then I'll go into my final comments. This master plan details recommendations 10 11 for actions of the local North Canton 12 government to help strengthen the community 13 and continually improve into the future. 14 Although the actions of the school district, 15 private developers, and ordinary citizens will play a major role in continuing to make 16 17 North Canton a great place to live, work, and play, this plan focuses only on activities 18 19 within the power of the North Canton City 20 government or its agents. The City should always work 21 22 collaboratively with other stakeholders for the benefit of the North Canton residents. 23 24 The opportunity we have here today 25 really, I -- I think focuses on land use.

1 And land use is a major element that is 2 involved under comprehensive planning. Our City administration understands the critical 3 4 role when it comes to land use, because each 5 level of government has a role to play 6 towards proper land use. 7 And working together, this City administration, the Jackson Township 8 9 Trustees, our North Canton City Council, our Jackson Township Economic Development 10 11 Director and Fiscal Officer, their Directors 12 of Law, the Directors of our finance 13 departments have all formulated policies with 14 the aim of ensuring proper use of land which 15 has resulted in a shared development agreement -- I continue -- benefiting our 16 17 respective localities and promoting communication, cooperation, and 18 19 collaboration, stimulating, which I'm hopeful 20 will be innovative possibilities. 21 The shared development agreement offers a 22 structure of dialogue, collaboration, shared 23 decision-making, enabling all parties to work 24 towards a common goal of strengthening the 25 North Canton and Jackson Township community

1	identities, cultivating businesses, and
2	positioning our communities for future
3	opportunities.
4	I want to thank everyone who has worked
5	diligently on this over the last several
6	months. That this wasn't hastily put
7	together to be presented tonight. I want to
8	thank all that are attending the hearing this
9	evening.
10	And most of all, I want to thank our
11	teams for their time, energy, and willingness
12	to work together for the betterment of our
13	communities. I greatly appreciate this
14	moment in time as we work together on this
15	major concern.
16	I think this is a historic event for our
17	county, let alone our two municipalities
18	or I should say our two communities, in
19	working together, again, to better not only
20	ourselves, but the people that we serve.
21	Thank you very much.
22	MR. STROIA: Thank you.
23	MR. HAWKE: Thank you.
24	MR. DEORIO: Council?
25	MR. STROIA: I'll go. I just want to

1 thank everybody that was involved in developing this. To me, this shows teamwork 2 and collaboration. 3 4 Four years ago, Jackson and North Canton 5 didn't have this relationship. I can't 6 imagine being here during rivalry week for --7 my head would be on the table. I would 8 wonder, who's going to throw a water balloon 9 at me or something. 10 But this shows you, you know, you can do 11 things without having a court battle over 12 annexation, and that seems to become more and 13 more inevitable with the laws that are being 14 passed. So I view this as a steppingstone to 15 maybe more future development. And I thank everybody for the opportunity. 16 17 MAYOR WILDER: Thank you. MS. WERREN: I think what I like best 18 19 about this agreement, too, is we always put 20 people in the middle. We put our 21 constituents in the middle, and they don't 22 know which way to go, they don't know who to 23 call, they don't know whether -- what 24 department to reach out to. And then we just 25 all hear that both localities are really

1 difficult to work with. And so this takes 2 that away. They are going to know where they stand 3 4 right from the beginning. It makes it clear 5 cut, and hopefully reduces lawyer fees, 6 reduces time to maybe start a new business 7 and creates job in a quicker fashion. So I really think it's excellent for both 8 sides of our communities. 9 MR. METHENEY: I think opportunities for 10 11 expansion and growth are very challenging for 12 townships, for cities, for anywhere, just 13 even in the State of Ohio. And finding that 14 opportunity for growth can be a challenge. 15 We have found through cooperation that we can benefit both. And I think we need to 16 17 stand on that as growth. 18 The land that we are talking about, most 19 of it being vacant, has been vacant forever. 20 It's not a redevelopment, tear down and build 21 something new. This is development of vacant 22 land. 23 So I think that for both of us, the City 24 and the Township, moving forward in this 25 agreement is going to be a positive step.

1	MR. MCCLEASTER: I think I'll just echo
2	what my colleagues have already said. I
3	mean, this is vacant land that has had no use
4	as long as I have been alive. And I think
5	this model is something that I would like
6	to hopefully more comes from it.
7	Again, to echo what Mr. Stroia said, us
8	collaborating and getting together, things
9	that I wouldn't have imagined years ago. And
10	I'm very excited to see it happen today.
11	So thank you all for the opportunity to
12	have us here today and thank you everybody
13	who was in the creation of this.
14	MR. ORR: Well, it's a great idea. It's
15	a win-win situation on vacant land that has
16	been there for years and years and years. So
17	I'm really excited about this. And I want to
18	thank you guys for having us over and all the
19	hard work that we put into this agreement.
20	MS. WEYRICK: Like everyone else, I can
21	just say same. Same. But thank you for
22	inviting us here and it's really I'm proud
23	of our economic development team and our
24	administration for making this happen. I
25	support it fully. And I will let Daryl go.

1	MR. REVOLDT: Go last.
2	MS. WEYRICK: Yeah.
3	MR. REVOLDT: Thank you. I'm frequently
4	reminded by our team that I am one of the
5	more senior members of the City. Old. John,
6	don't laugh. We have we are just replete
7	with all sorts of Title IX violations. Okay?
8	But I come to this table tonight with
9	probably close to 20 years of economic
10	development experience; State of Ohio,
11	private sector, and in the City.
12	And a couple of things that I have
13	learned is that projects want certainty,
14	particularly big projects, worthwhile
15	projects. They want to get in, they want to
16	pull the trigger, they want to get it built.
17	They want to operate. And anything that
18	municipalities can do to remove that
19	uncertainty makes your site a better
20	location.
21	Second is that projects can benefit from
22	new municipal economic development programs.
23	John and Randy and I have been on
24	opposite sides historically. We are the
25	older guys here.

1	MR. DEORIO: No.
2	MR. REVOLDT: Oh, sorry, John.
3	MR. PIZZINO: Randy is the older guy.
4	MR. REVOLDT: I know. But having
5	having experienced it both ways, I can tell
6	you from experience, this is the better way
7	to go.
8	I believe that Jackson and North Canton
9	face the same common challenge, development
10	and redevelopment. How do you maximize
11	development on the real estate under your
12	jurisdiction? How do we do it with us? I
13	think we do it by collaborating. It just
14	makes sense.
15	For example, when we do a project,
16	Mr. DeOrio has a list of a checklist, ten
17	cri development criteria. And at the very
18	top of the list are capital investment and
19	job count. We are not interested in strip
20	malls. We want things that really drive
21	municipal finance.
22	If we are working together, part of the
23	economic development process is prospecting.
24	Wouldn't it be better if we were teamed up
25	together to prospect for opportunities than

1	butting heads? Of course we would be.
2	And, again, people who have big projects
3	prospect. They look. We want we want to
4	have everybody's radar up. And when that
5	happens, Jackson Township benefits, North
6	Canton benefits.
7	I think we have the likelihood of
8	stronger success when we are partnered. And
9	that's just looking back over the many years
10	when we weren't. I think this gets both of
11	us to a much better place. And I think we
12	have got the makings of a great relationship.
13	I'm not troubled by the duration of the
14	contract. I think the terms are terrific.
15	If you read them, they are good, subject to
16	tough negotiation. But I think we got
17	something that's workable.
18	And my challenge to Mr. DeOrio is let's
19	get a project going, you know. Let's
20	let's get we got good proof of concept up
21	there in North Canton already. And I think
22	we can I think we can deliver to both our
23	respective jurisdictions in the future.
24	And the beauty of it is we don't have to
25	rush. That's the other thing. Because we

1 control the dirt. We control the project. 2 That's kind of our mantra. And I think we'll have at the end of the day something we both 3 4 can be proud of. 5 So I support this without reservation. 6 MR. GONZALEZ: If I could just add a 7 little bit to that, because I think you're 8 making the same point that I'm thinking. You 9 talked about us both benefiting. North Canton has bought some substantial land in 10 11 Jackson Township. And under what Daryl was 12 saying, that -- and they tried to annex, that 13 would have ended up in a court battle. 14 The taxpayers would have been footing the 15 deal, the attorneys would have made some money off of it, and we would have hung this 16 17 thing up and gone through the appeals process 18 and probably the Supreme Court. And you know 19 who pays for that? The taxpayers. 20 Under this agreement, what it does is it 21 gives not only North Canton a chance to 22 annex, it gives us a chance to support that 23 annexation. Because we might going to the 24 table with North Canton, and if they are 25 trying to bring this company in that's going

to create some living jobs that are going to pay for living wages, everybody benefits from that.

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And we may even help with the economic 4 5 development tools. We may do an abatement, 6 and sit down with Pat and say, hey, if we can 7 do something to help you guys sell this to bring this company in, Jackson Township is 8 9 going to benefit, because our property taxes 10 are going to go up, and they are going to 11 benefit because they are going to bring in 12 all these jobs. And that's a heck of a 13 result versus them -- versus going to court. 14 Right? And hanging it up for years. 15 So we have tried to hammer those things 16 out upfront. 17 MR. REVOLDT: Well, Randy, I think that speaks of this whole notion of certainty on a 18 19 If we are -- if we are in the project. prospect stage, we can -- we can say we can 20 21 deliver by date certain. It makes the 22 likelihood of that deal that much better. 23 MR. HAWKE: John.

24MR. PIZZINO: Well, I would like to thank25everybody for coming. It is great to see two

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1 government entities can get together and accomplish what we are -- hopefully 2 accomplishing, what we are doing this 3 4 evening. 5 And what happened years ago, you know, it 6 wasn't Daryl was right or I was right --7 well, I was right and Daryl was wrong. 8 But --9 MR. REVOLDT: I think Daryl was wrong. 10 MR. PIZZINO: You can ask Terry Moore. 11 He just walked in. I always want to win. 12 MR. MOORE: And John is always right. 13 MR. REVOLDT: That's my problem, too. 14 MR. PIZZINO: But, anyway, we were both 15 doing what we had to do for our communities. We were -- we were protecting our 16 17 communities. We were protecting our tax base. 18 19 What I heard tonight here and what 20 everybody says, I'm in agreement. This is a 21 great, great opportunity for both of us for 22 getting together, with shared services, 23 working together, supporting each other, and 24 not -- maybe -- maybe in something else down 25 the road also.

1	But I just want to thank everybody for
2	coming this evening and being a part of this.
3	And I'll turn it over to our Chairman here.
4	MR. HAWKE: Mr. Hardesty, anything?
5	MR. HARDESTY: Sure. I echo what
6	everybody else has said. I love the removal
7	of the uncertainty, and then partnership
8	versus alternatives that are nothing
9	happens or something bad happens and you are
10	in court.
11	To me, it's no it's an easy decision.
12	So I'm very very pleased about what I'm
13	hearing.
14	MAYOR WILDER: Thank you.
15	MR. HAWKE: And I would expand a little
16	bit on the win-win side of that, too. I
17	mean, it's truly kind of four wins. You
18	know, we each as entities, as governments,
19	win in this process, and I think all the
20	residents across Stark County win.
21	Because let's let's be honest, too, as
22	you build businesses out, people working in
23	that location may be from North Canton, may
24	be from Jackson, may be from Perry. They may
25	be from Canton. They may be wherever.

1 And they are going to get a -- potentially can have a better paying job than jobs that 2 3 are there. 4 And then I think, you know, when we look 5 at it, too, to Daryl's point, the businesses 6 win. Because this is -- this is seen as a 7 good thing. This is people coming in. We are bringing them here, that we maybe would 8 not have been able to do otherwise. So being 9 10 able to do that prospecting together and 11 being able to go out and talk to those folks 12 and do it is a good thing. 13 I've been -- spent the last five-plus 14 years working on just this across the county 15 with other groups and volunteer work that I have done. 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
