# **CHIEF'S MESSAGE**

Jackson Township is well underway with all of our summertime activities; the high school graduation has commenced and Safety Village was once again a huge success. As we gear up for the Nash Family Jackson Amphitheater Concert Series, Community Celebration, July 4th fireworks events, as well as all of the Pro Football Hall of Fame festivities, the Jackson Township Fire Department (JTFD) has engaged in a year-long process of conducting a form of strategic planning. Being extremely community oriented, the department wants to ensure that the safety needs are being met and exceeded.

Strategic planning evaluates what an organization needs to continue doing, along with exploring opportunities for improvement. The JTFD has always been staffed with state-certified Firefighters and EMT/Paramedics. Through the years, the department has increased the number of state-certified Fire and EMS certified instructors. These instructors ensure that, not only our members, but also those from neighboring departments, obtain relevant and current continuing education opportunities related to many threats encountered, such as the increased demand for lithium ion batteries. (Side note, we had several residential fires in 2023 related to these batteries.) The department has a staffed fire prevention/fire investigation bureau made up of state-certified life safety inspectors. A majority of our company officers have earned this certification in order to recognize potential fire hazards, along with the process in place to address such issues.

# **SEASONAL SAFETY MESSAGE**

# **Fireworks Safety**

Fireworks are often used to mark special events and holidays. The safest way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. It is important to know that fireworks are potentially not safe in the hands of consumers. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

#### **National Fire Protection Association Facts:**

- More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.

- Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- Sparklers account for roughly onequarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

Additionally, per the National Safety Council, fireworks start an average of 18,500 fires each year, including 1,300 structure fires, 300 vehicle fires and nearly 17,000 other fires.

# **Carbon Monoxide and Boating Safety**

Gasoline-powered engines on boats, including onboard generators, produce carbon monoxide (CO), a colorless and odorless gas that can poison or kill someone who breathes too much of it. Traveling at slow speeds or idling in the water can cause CO to build up in a boat's cabin, cockpit, bridge, aft deck, or in an open area. Wind from the aft section of the boat can increase this buildup of CO.

The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are headache, dizziness, weakness, nausea, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. High levels of CO inhalation can cause death. CO poisoning can also cause you to pass out, fall into the water and drown. A person who is sleeping or intoxicated can die from CO poisoning before ever having symptoms. Install and maintain a working CO detector listed by Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) as appropriate for marine use inside the boat.

# Tips to prevent marine CO poisoning:

- Properly install and maintain all fuel-burning engines and appliances;
- Educate all passengers about the signs and symptoms of CO poisoning;
- Swim and play away from areas where engines vent their exhaust;
- Watch children closely when they play on rear swim decks or water platforms;
- Never block exhaust outlets. Blocking outlets can cause CO to build up in the cabin and cockpit areas—even when hatches, windows, portholes, and doors are closed; and
- Dock, beach, or anchor at least 20 feet away from the nearest boat that is running a generator or engine. Exhaust from a nearby vessel can send CO into the cabin and cockpit of a boat.

If you think a person on your boat has CO poisoning move him or her to fresh air right away and dial 9-1-1 for Jackson Township emergency services.

To help protect our neighborhood kids from speeders and promote safer streets, we want to remind residents of our portable speed sign program. These signs display and record vehicle speeds in real-time, serving as a proactive measure and visual reminder for drivers to slow down and adhere to posted speed limits.

Signing up for the portable speed sign program is easy. Simply submit a request via phone call or email to the Jackson Township Police Department. Please include your name, the requested area (including cardinal direction if applicable), and a contact email if you would like to receive the digital records from the speed sign.

Once your request is received, it will be placed on the deployment waiting list and scheduled for placement in your neighborhood at or near the specified location. These signs are invaluable tools and play a crucial role in identifying problem areas for increased enforcement that help our officers address speeding concerns effectively.

We encourage all residents to submit their requests soon, as slots for the portable speed sign program fill up quickly. Together, we can work to create safer streets and protect our children from the dangers of speeding vehicles.

# Crime Prevention **TIPS**

# **I. Secure Your Home:**

Ensure all doors and windows are locked when you leave your home, even if only for a short time. Invest in sturdy locks for doors and windows, as well as a security system or cameras for added protection. Keep shrubs and trees trimmed to eliminate potential hiding spots for burglars.

# 2. Be Vigilant in Your Neighborhood:

Get to know your neighbors and look out for each other. Report any suspicious activity to the Jackson Township Police Department immediately.

Join or start a neighborhood watch program to collectively monitor and deter criminal activity in your area. Install outdoor lighting and motion sensors to illuminate dark areas around your home, deterring potential intruders.

# **3. Protect Your Personal Belongings:**

Avoid leaving valuables such as laptops, smartphones, or packages visible in your car. Lock them in the trunk or take them with you.

Lock your car doors, even when parked in your driveway. 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

# PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Public Works
Department consists of
four different divisions
within the Township.
Each have made strides
and continue to provide
the much desired services
to our residents. The
Central Maintenance

Division includes three Mechanics, three Building Maintenance workers and a Superintendent. Our Highway Division includes sixteen Labor Specialists, a Foreman, an Inspector and a Superintendent. The Parks Division consists of seven Crew Leaders, a Park Superintendent, a Recreation Superintendent and one Coordinator within the Amphitheater Division.

Each of these divisions are supported by the administrative staff within the Public Works Department, which is made up of an Administrative Assistant, a Clerical Assistant and the Public Works Director.

# **Central Maintenance**

Our Central Maintenance Division continues to provide service to each of our Fire and Police Departments, as well as our Highway Division as it relates to vehicle maintenance. Our Building side of this division completes all maintenance, inspections and oversees any contractors and projects taking place within all Township owned and operated buildings.

# **Highway**

The Jackson Township Highway Division has had the ability to start many projects early this year due to the weather. Curbing and catch basin repairs are underway, as well as minor asphalt repairs for areas within this year's resurfacing program.

As part of an updated permit process within this division, we have been able to work hand-in-hand with not only our residents regarding new driveways and drive culvert replacements, but to ensure each utility company that conducts work within or along our Township roads are doing work in a proper fashion. This process has provided our Highway Division to better monitor each project and make certain the infrastructure within the Township stays functioning as designed.

# **Parks**

Our Park Division continues to make strides with our parks. Many projects were accomplished last year, which include all earthwork and seeding being completed at Schuring Park, and three ball fields were re-constructed. Projects that are being worked on this year are the resurfacing of both tennis courts and interior parking lots within North Park along with the renovating of three more ball fields. We are also reviewing some ideas to revamp the North Park Playground area by expanding it to the north and updating some of the current features within and around it.

# **Nash Family Jackson Amphitheater**

As the 2024 season is upon us, some new features will be noticeable within the Nash Family Jackson Amphitheater. The new Concession/Restroom Facility was opened for our final show last season and will be in full operation this year. A new Front of House structure was constructed this off-season which houses both our sound and lighting staff, and a new 30' x 10' video wall has been installed on the east wall of the Amphitheater. This was made

possible by the generous donation from the Nash Family last season.

# ROAD **CLOSURES:**

# **STARTING WEDNESDAY, JUNE 19, 2024 THROUGH SATURDAY, JUNE 22, 2024**

Fulton Drive, N.W., between Wales Rd (State Route 241) and Cliff Ave., will close to both eastbound and westbound traffic daily on Wednesday, June 19, 2024 at 5:00pm, Thursday, June 20, 2024 at 5:00pm, Friday, June 21, 2024 at 4:00pm & Saturday, June 22, 2024 at 1:00pm. Those seeking to park at Jackson High School may enter through Caritas Circle N.W., or at the high school's entrance adjacent to the old school house, (special access from Fulton Drive and Cliff Ave will be provided).

# **ON FRIDAY, JUNE 21, 2024**

The Community Celebration will require the closing of the Township roads to accommodate the 5K run. The road closures could last up to (1) hour.

- 1. Mudbrook Street from Wales to Drexel Ave beginning at 8:30 p.m. The remainder of the roads listed below will close at 9:00 p.m.
- 2. Courtland Avenue from Mudbrook Avenue to Chervl Lane Street.
- 3. Cheryl Lane Street from Courtland to Cranford Street.
- 4. Courtland Avenue south of Cheryl Lane Street.
- 5. Ruth Lane Avenue south of Cheryl Lane Street.
- 6. Cranford Street from Cheryl Lane Street to Vantage Hill Avenue.
- 7. Vantage Hill Avenue from Cranford Street to Cheryl Lane Street.
- 8. Cheryl Lane Avenue from Vantage Hill Avenue to Arlington Avenue.
- 9. Arlington Avenue from Fulton Road to Mubrook Street.
- 10. Greenwich Boulevard from Arlington to Old Bridge Street.
- 11. Old Bridge Street from Greenwich Boulevard to Abington Street.
- 12. Abington Street from Old Bridge Street to Arlington Avenue (to Windy Lane Street).
- 13. Windy Lane Street from Arlington Avenue to Windward Trace Circle.
- 14. No access from Cliff Avenue until all runners have passed this point.
- 15. Windward Trace Circle to the 7800 Block, until all runners have entered the park.

# Construction / Profects for 2024

#### **Central Maintenance**

- The Safety Center geothermal system has undergone a complete flush for the first time since the building was constructed and our staff is continuously working to make it better.
- Many other building upgrades are taking place this season which include new roofs, new driveways, sidewalks and interior updates with painting, flooring and cameras.

#### **Highway Division**

- Resurfacing: The bid has been awarded to Superior Paving to complete roughly 16.5 miles of roads within the Township for the amount of \$1.6 M.
- Curbing Replacement: The bid has been awarded to T.R. Snyder to compete roughly 6,000 linear feet of curbing for \$289,381.20.
- Restriping of Roadways: Project went out to bid on May 14.
- Many road drainage projects will be taking place within the Township to address bad or worn out culvert pipes and catch basins. Most of this work will be completed within our repaving program prior to new asphalt being laid.
- Community Parkway Lighting: All poles have been installed and we are working with Thompson Electric and First Energy to complete the project. These poles mimic the poles you see on both Wales Avenue and Fulton Drive.
- The Keck Park Circle NW intersection project has been completed.

# **Parks Division**

- Tennis Court Resurfacing: The six older courts within North Park went out to bid on May 14. This will also include the "butterfly" parking lot in North Park
- North Park Playground Upgrade: The Township is currently reviewing options to upgrade the playground, which includes an expansion to the north area inside the fence, as well as new equipment. This would also include updating the surrounding area.
- Ball field renovations: After completing three fields last fall, three more will be scheduled this season.
- Schuring Park Phase I has been completed. Phase II is currently under review and includes items such as asphalting the roadways and parking lots.

# **PLATTING A SUBDIVISION**

When a subdivision is proposed to be platted, a preliminary site plan must be submitted to Stark County Regional Planning for review and approval. Stark County Regional Planning forwards a copy of the plan to pertinent departments such as Jackson Township Zoning, Jackson Township Fire, Building, Health, Sanitary Engineering, Soil and Water Conservation, Stark County Engineering, and Access Management as well as other pertinent departments for review and comments. Jackson Township Zoning is just one step in the process and

reviews the preliminary plan to ensure it meets the zoning requirements for the district in which it is located. Stark County Regional Planning reviews all comments received from the departments and, although the preliminary plan could be denied, normally the preliminary plan will receive conditional approval based on certain conditions. Upon meeting all conditions per the comments received, a final plat is submitted to Stark County Regional Planning for approval. Upon receiving approval, the plat can be recorded and zoning and building permits can be obtained.

Within the past year the following preliminary plans have been submitted to the Township for approval:

- Julian Farms: 56 Single Family lots (R-R Rural Residential and R-1 Single Family Low Density Residential District)
- **Hawk's Ridge:** 93 Single Family lots (*R-R Rural Residential District*)
- **The Glens of Jackson:** 62 Single Family lot (R-1 Single Family Low Density Residential District)
- **Eastlake Meadows/aka Frank Farm:** 83 Single Family lots (*R-R Rural Residential District*)

# **VARIANCE REQUESTS TO THE BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS**

Any property owner who wishes to apply for a variance from the zoning resolution has a right to do so by filing an application with the Board of Zoning Appeals. The board reviews each application to determine if it complies with the purpose and intent of the zoning resolution and evidence demonstrates that the literal enforcement of the resolution will result in a practical difficulty. The following factors are considered and weighted by the Board of Zoning Appeals in determining a practical difficulty.

- 1. Whether special conditions and circumstances exist which are peculiar to the land or structure involved and which are not applicable generally to other lands or structures in the same zoning district; examples of such special conditions or circumstances are: exceptional irregularity, narrowness, shallowness or steepness of the lot.
- 2. Whether the property in question will yield a reasonable return or whether there can be any beneficial use of the property without a variance.
- 3. Whether the variance is substantial and is the minimum necessary to make possible the reasonable use of the land or structures.
- 4. Whether the essential character of the neighborhood would be substantially altered or whether adjoining properties would suffer substantial detriment as a result of the variance.
- 5. Whether the variance would adversely affect the delivery of governmental services such as water, sewer, and trash pickup.
- 6. Whether special conditions or circumstances exist as a result of actions of the owner.
- 7. Whether the property owner's predicament feasibly can be obviated through some method other than a variance.
- 8. Whether the spirit and intent behind the zoning requirement would be observed and substantial justice done by granting a variance.
- 9. Whether the granting of the variance requested will confer on the applicant any special privilege that is denied by this regulation to other lands, structures, or buildings in the same district.

When submitting for a variance the answers to the aforementioned criteria, in writing, shall be submitted with the application and other pertinent information as the criteria is reviewed and must be considered by the Board of Zoning Appeal prior to determining if the request should be denied or approved. The variance application fee is \$500.00 and is non-refundable.

The Board of Zoning Appeals shall not have the authority to permit a use where such use is not permitted by the resolution.

Decisions by the Board of Zoning Appeals granting or denying variances shall be final within the Township. Anyone who does not agree with the decision of the Board of Zoning Appeals has the right to appeal the decision to the Court of Common Pleas within thirty (30) days of the date of the decision.

# **PROPERTY MAINTENANCE**

The Ohio Revised Code 505.86 provides the Board of Trustees the authority to remove, repair, or secure buildings or other structures in the Township that have been declared insecure, unsafe, or structurally defective or uninhabitable. Your property is a valuable asset so it is important to keep it free of debris and ensure all structures are in a safe, secured and in a habitable condition not only to protect the value of your property, but also to protect your neighbor's property values and ensure that Jackson Township continues to be a great place to live.

# Jackson Township Historical Society (Jills)



The JTHS is located at 7756 Fulton Drive in the one room schoolhouse originally called the Jackson Center School. The schoolhouse was built around 1860 and is one of the five original schools still standing. The JTHS rescued the building in 2000 when it was donated with the provision that it be moved. Dedicated volunteers and businesses hoisted the building on a truck and drove it through North Park to its current location.

A basement was dug, the second story removed, and a new roof was put on. New windows, an addition and a parking lot were added. Flooring was added with wood from a chicken coop, and the bell tower was handmade by Dr. Steve Hickman and installed on the roof.

Thousands of items have been donated to JTHS to preserve history. As caretakers of these items, they take pride in preserving them according to the best archival practices. The archival supplies are expensive. A fundraiser titled "Christmas in July" or "Adopt a Box" is in the planning process. Community members who care to make a monetary donation can donate an archival box or drawer.

Their names would be listed as donors on that space. Money can also be donated to the general archival fund. This is a way you can help preserve the artifacts that were donated to JTHS, which is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

JTHS would like to thank everyone who donated to the fundraiser to purchase a professional document/book scanner. Large photos, documents, newspapers, maps, and more can now be safely digitized for easy access.

Volunteers recently updated the siding on the addition and the trim with money raised from "Beat North Canton Heritage Society Fundraiser" last October. Thank you for your support that allowed us to Beat Hoover. Hopefully, next year will be a repeat win. The money raised will go to the building fund for future repairs.

You are invited to visit our booth at the Jackson Community Celebration. Money raised from selling popcorn, cotton candy and pop, at the celebration will go to the general fund to help pay the bills.



# SUMMER STORMWATER TIPS

Now that summer is officially here, and the kids are out of school, outdoor activities such as swimming, fishing, car washing and lawn care are a part of our everyday activities. All of these activities have one central thing in common: they impact our waterways in Jackson Township.

# **PROTECT OUR WATERWAYS**

In an effort to protect our valuable waterways that become summer recreation sources during hot weather and the organisms and fish that live in them, the Township would like to provide some tips to residents for controlling water pollution from stormwater discharges:


- Do not dump anything in the storm sewer, such as antifreeze, cleaning supplies, motor oil, paint, etc.
- Do not use excessive amounts of pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers on
- If you live adjacent to a waterway, do not mow up to the ditch or stream bank; leave a tall grass buffer to minimize runoff and erosion.
- Install a rain garden to minimize runoff and treat stormwater with attractive native plants.
- Make sure no chlorine is present in pool or spa water before draining the structure. Discharge the water slowly over an open grassy area, not into a stream or storm sewer system.

- Pick up after your pet; pet waste contributes significant amounts of bacteria to our waterways. Dispose of pet waste in the trash.
- Pick up litter to keep our storm sewers and waterways clean.
- Reuse stormwater by collecting it in rain barrels to water plants later.
- Stormwater runoff is most effectively controlled by slowing the water down and allowing it to infiltrate back into the ground slowly. Install pervious pavement, such as paving blocks, grid pavers, pervious concrete or pervious asphalt so water will infiltrate and not immediately run off.
- Take care to absorb spilled fluids from auto maintenance using absorbent towels or kitty litter. Dispose of these items in the trash.
- Wash your car on the lawn or take it to a commercial car wash to minimize pollutant runoff.
