THE INVISIBLE CRISIS:

Why
Abolishing
Property
Taxes
Could End
Ohio
Townships...

There has been much written and said about the movement to abolish property taxes in Ohio. What remains dangerously underappreciated is the outsized, potentially fatal impact this would have on Ohio's 1,308 townships. Below is an introductory explanation of impacts to Townships in a question and answer format. We recognize the complexity of this issue

and yet want to pass accurate and concise information to you as a starting point. As we proceed through the calendar year, please watch the Township's website and social media for more information.

What do property taxes pay for?

At the township level, these funds are the lifeblood of daily existence. They pay for **fire protection and EMS, police departments, road maintenance and snow removal, and local parks.** Without them, these services do not just shrink—they vanish.

What is the impact?

Townships, in their present form, would likely cease to exist. Jackson Township would no longer be as we now know it. All the great amenities and services that make Jackson Township such a great place to live, work and play would be significantly impacted or discontinued. Unlike cities, which have more diversified revenue streams, townships are a "grassroots" form of government with almost no safety net.

Why would this happen?

The math is stark. Ohio townships receive approximately **90% or more** of their operating revenue from local property taxes. Under current state law, townships are **not permitted** to collect income taxes or sales taxes to bridge this gap. Without a massive overhaul of the Ohio Revised Code to grant

them new taxing authority, they would be left with no path forward.

The Road to the 2026 Ballot

The movement to enact this change is currently active. To abolish property taxes via a Constitutional amendment, the following steps must be completed:

1. **Secure Signatures:** Proponents must gather at least **413,488 valid signatures** by July 1, 2026, to place the initiative on the November 3, 2026, ballot.
2. **Public Vote:** A simple majority of Ohioans must vote "Yes" to pass the amendment.

A Question of Representation

Township populations are not insignificant; they represent **roughly 35%** (over 1/3) of Ohio's population. However, because this is a Constitutional change, the entire state votes. This means the 2/3 of the population living in municipal areas (cities and villages) - who already have the power to levy income taxes - will effectively decide the fate of township residents who have no such alternative.

If passed, the amendment would take effect on **January 1, 2027**, leaving a dangerously short window for a solution.

What are a Township's options?

The future is uncertain. Without a state-funded "bailout" or new taxing rights, townships may be forced to:

- **Incorporate:** Attempt to become a city or village to gain income tax authority, though this often requires high population density and brings significantly higher administrative costs.
- **Merge or Absorb:** Be absorbed into neighboring cities, losing their unique rural or suburban identity and local control.
- **Dissolve:** Simply cease providing services, leaving residents to rely on overextended county or private providers for basic safety.

These parks are open **one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset**.

Pets are permitted in all township parks **EXCEPT** North Park.

Dogs must be leashed, and owners are required to clean up after their pets.

JACKSON TOWNSHIP PARK SYSTEM

Jackson Township maintains eight parks totaling approximately 300 acres, offering a wide range of recreational amenities:

- **North Park (70 acres):**
Pavilion, restrooms, accessible playground, 1.1-mile paved walking track, athletic fields, tennis courts, basketball courts, pickleball courts, sand volleyball courts, and a stocked fishing pond with boardwalk and gazebo.
Note: Pets are prohibited at North Park.
- **South Park (95 acres):**
Two miles of hiking trails, picnic pavilions, playground, sand volleyball court, horseshoe pit, multiple athletic fields, concession stand, and the township's park maintenance facility.
- **Joseph E. Fisher Park (27 acres):**
Soccer fields, ball fields, playground, pavilion, and restrooms.
- **Crystal Springs Bridge Park:**
Historic bridge site with access to the scenic Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath.
- **Edward and Mary Zink Park:**
Neighborhood green space dedicated to community beautification.
- **Stuhldreher Street Fields (11 acres):**
Two full-size soccer fields with adjacent parking.

- **Strausser Elementary Park:**

Three small soccer fields and two multipurpose fields through partnership with Jackson Local Schools.

- **Kirk Schuring Park (40 acres):**

Future sports complex designed for active recreation with planned connectivity to Stark Parks and nearby retail areas.

FACILITY RESERVATIONS

Beginning in 2026, all sports and events require a permit.

To reserve a pavilion, athletic field, tennis court, or pickleball court, visit www.jacksontwp.com and select *Field, Court & Event Reservations under the Parks and Recreation Division.



Jackson Township implemented the RecDesk scheduling system in February 2025. RecDesk includes a public calendar displaying all park activities, including events at township-maintained school fields.

Permits for pavilions and/or fields must be secured at least one week prior to your event.

JACKSON TOWNSHIP FIREFIGHTER TRAINING:



Vertical Ventilation

Jackson Township firefighters completed hands-on vertical ventilation training using the “7-9-8” or “coffin cut” technique. This training helps crews safely remove heat and smoke during structure fires, improving conditions for firefighters and increasing occupant survivability.



Standpipe Training

Jackson Township firefighters trained on standpipe operations, sharpening the skills needed to fight fires in multi-story buildings. This training ensures crews can quickly access water on upper floors and remain ready to protect lives and property at any height.

Police vs Fire: Bench-off Challenge

The Police and Fire Departments recently participated in a friendly Bench-Off Challenge at *Anytime Fitness*, where participants bench-pressed 135 pounds for as many reps as possible. One police officer recorded the top individual performance with 80 reps, while the Fire Department earned this year’s traveling trophy. Community Non-Perishable Food Drive

The community’s support during the Jackson Township Community Food Drive was incredible. In just two hours, residents donated 197 bags of food and nearly \$300,

SEASONAL SAFETY MESSAGE

Recreational Fires:

Spring is a time when many residents begin cleaning up their yards, enjoying outdoor spaces, and firing up grills and fire pits. While these activities are part of spring gatherings, they can also increase the risk of accidental fires if proper precautions aren’t taken.

To help reduce that risk, residents are reminded to:

1. Always supervise recreational fires
2. Keep recreational fires a safe distance from buildings and combustible materials
3. Avoid burning during windy conditions

Recreational fires for barbecues, campfires, and cookouts should only be fueled by clean, seasoned firewood (or equivalent), with a wood stack no larger than 2 feet high by 3 feet wide.

Open burning in Ohio is regulated by the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency’s Air Pollution Control Division. Residents are encouraged to follow all applicable state regulations before conducting any outdoor burning.

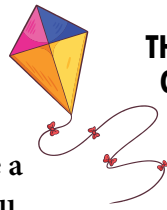

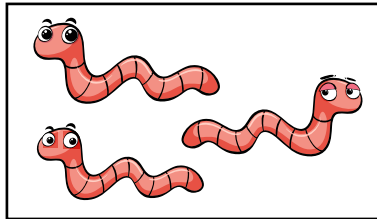

It looks like we are finally through another winter! Hopefully the snow and ice are behind us, and we can now look ahead to warm weather and sunshine.

We would like to sincerely thank our Highway Division for the outstanding job they did plowing and opening roads throughout the Township. Our crews worked tirelessly to keep roadways safe and accessible for residents and emergency vehicles. While we understand that expectations may differ, our responsibility is to ensure safe, passable roads for the entire community.

A few important reminders for residents:

- **Driveway snow:** When plows pass the end of driveways, snow will be pushed back onto shoveled areas. This is unavoidable, as the snow must go somewhere. Lifting the plow at every driveway is not feasible and would significantly delay route completion.
- **Mailbox access:** Maintaining access to mailboxes is the responsibility of the resident. If snow drifts block mail delivery, residents will need to clear access to their mailbox.
- **Mailbox damage:** If a plow directly strikes and damages a mailbox, the Township will replace it. If snow pressure pushes over a mailbox post or knocks a mailbox loose, it is generally assumed the structure was previously damaged or in need of repair.
- **Road conditions:** Roads are plowed and salted multiple times during snow events. When packed snow remains, it is often due to temperatures being too cold for salt to be effective. Crews will continue cleanup as conditions improve.
- **On-street parking:** Please avoid parking vehicles or trailers on roadways when snow is forecasted. Clear roads allow plow drivers to work safely and efficiently. During parking bans, vehicles left on the roadway may be ticketed or towed.

Our skilled drivers take their responsibilities seriously and do not intentionally cause damage to private property. If an incident occurs, please contact the Township so the Highway Division can investigate and work toward a resolution.

YARD WASTE SITE

OVER THE PAST FEW YEARS, THE TOWNSHIP HAS EXPERIENCED SEVERAL RECURRING ISSUES AT THE YARD WASTE SITE INVOLVING THE DISPOSAL OF UNAUTHORIZED MATERIALS.

These situations require staff to remove non-permitted items, review camera footage to identify the responsible party, and, in many cases, revoke the individual's access card.

To address these concerns, additional cameras will be installed this season to better monitor both the materials being deposited and those accessing the site. Improper disposal results in added costs to the Township, including increased removal service charges and impacts to departmental budgets.

We ask every resident who utilizes this service to familiarize yourself with the following rules:

- No commercial lawn and/or commercial tree service may use the site
- No tree or plant branches larger than two (2") inches in diameter, and longer than four (4') feet.
- No cut trees
- No logs
- No stumps
- No construction materials, no treated wood
- No dirt, no stones

2026 RESURFACING PROJECT

The 2025 paving season presented several challenges due to fluctuating weather conditions, which resulted in delays to a portion of the resurfacing program. After meeting with the awarded contractor, the Township determined it was in the best interest of the project to postpone the remaining work until spring 2026 to ensure quality and long-term performance.

Looking ahead, the 2026 Road Resurfacing Program will move forward as planned. The Board of Trustees has approved \$2.5 million in the 2026 budget to continue addressing roadway needs throughout the Township, with a focus on areas requiring the most attention.

Once approved, a complete list of proposed 2026 project locations will be available on the Jackson Township website.

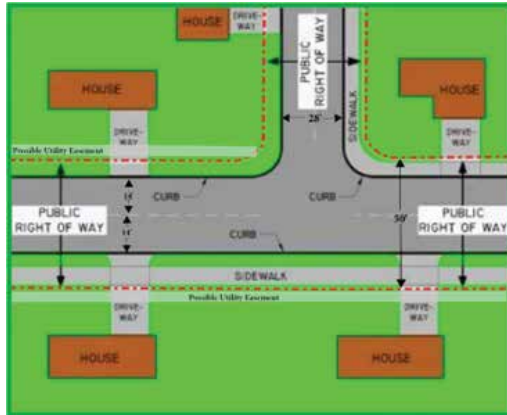

Click the tab and follow the prompts to submit your concern. Submissions are reviewed daily by our administrative staff and allow you to include photos of the issue, if available.

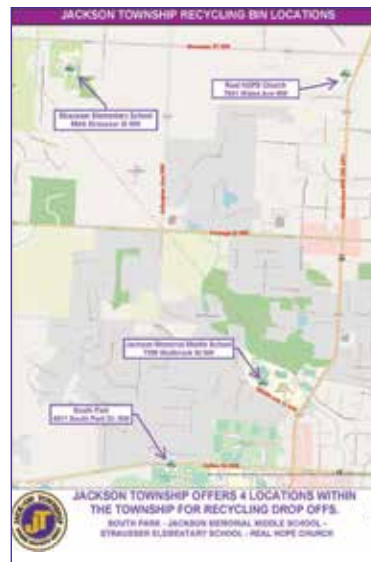

PERMITS AND PROJECTS

It has been a long and challenging winter for our community, and as we look ahead, we're hopeful that spring is just around the corner. With warmer weather approaching, many township residents may be planning property improvements such as additions or alterations.

Before starting any project, please be sure to contact the zoning department. Most construction projects require a zoning permit and/or a building permit from the Stark County Building Department. Failing to secure the proper permits and comply with applicable regulations can result in penalty fees in addition to permit costs. In most cases, if zoning requirements are not met and a variance is not approved, the structure may have to be removed due to noncompliance.

As a reminder all permits are submitted and processed electronically through the citizens portal, which can be accessed on the zoning department page of our website at www.jacksontownship.com. You may also access the portal directly at <https://jacksontownship.portal.iworq.net/portalhome/jacksontownship>.

INSPECTIONS

The Jackson Township Zoning Investigator removed 908 illegal temporary signs from the road right of way within Jackson Township in 2025.

Ninety-Five (95) complaints were received and investigated regarding property issues in 2025.

BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS AND ZONING COMMISSION MEMBERS

Board members for the Board of Appeals and Zoning Commission are appointed by the Jackson Township Board of Trustees. Each board consists of five regular members who are appointed to a five-year staggered term and may consist of up to two alternates who are appointed for a one-year term. Board members whose terms are expiring can apply for reappointment.

Edward McDonnell served as a member of the Board of Zoning Appeals from January 1, 1994 until December 31, 2025. Edward served as Chairman for many years and was a great asset to the Board of Zoning Appeals regarding decisions for those requesting variances and conditional use permits. We wish Edward well in his future adventures and thank him for thirty-one years of service to Jackson Township.

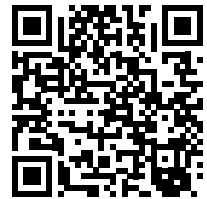

JACKSON TOWNSHIP ELECTRIC AGGREGATION

PROGRAM UPDATE

Jackson Township's current twelve (12) month electric supply agreement with Dynegy is set to expire for both Ohio Edison and AEP customers with the August 2026 meter reads. As this date approaches, the Township - working closely with our consultant, has been actively preparing for a seamless continuation of the electric aggregation program.

To ensure the best possible outcome for residents and small businesses, the Township's consultant invited all eligible electric suppliers to submit proposals for the next program term. A variety of bids were received, offering different pricing structures and contract lengths. While electricity prices have experienced a modest increase since the start of the current agreement, the Township remains committed to securing a program that provides both price stability and budget predictability through a competitive fixed rate.

After a thorough review of current market conditions and supplier proposals, the Township and its consultant have agreed on a strategic approach moving forward. At this time, the recommendation is to continue monitoring the market for an opportunity to secure a rate below \$0.10 per kilowatt-hour (kWh). Although some current offers are approaching that level, they are not yet considered favorable for long-term commitment.

Presently, the most competitive offer received is from Dynegy, proposing a 16-month term at a rate of \$0.1017/kWh. However, energy markets are highly dynamic, and pricing can fluctuate daily. The Township's consultant will continue to track these changes and keep the Township informed of any favorable developments.

The preferred strategy is to lock in the longest available term at a rate below \$0.10/kWh. If such pricing does not materialize by June 1, the Township's consultant will provide guidance on whether to accept a shorter-term offer slightly above that threshold or temporarily pause the program and return participants to the utility's default supply until more favorable market conditions emerge.

Because any market improvements may be brief, the Township is prepared to act quickly when a favorable rate becomes available. Timely authorization will be essential to secure pricing and allow for the necessary coordination among the supplier, utility, and consultant to ensure uninterrupted service when the current agreement expires.

Once a new rate and supplier are selected, the Township's consultant will assist the Township in preparing informational materials, including news releases, frequently asked questions, and website updates. Notification letters will be mailed in July to eligible residents and small businesses outlining the new offer. As always, participation is entirely voluntary. Customers will have twenty (21) days to opt out before being automatically enrolled.

Originally approved by voters in November 2010, Jackson Township's electric aggregation program continues to serve as a valuable option for residents seeking to better manage their electricity costs. The program includes no early termination fees, and participants may leave at any time, for any reason, without penalty.

Township residents have two additional options, in addition to Jackson's Aggregation program: first, residents can stay on the default pricing (also known as the price to beat, or variable rate) through your utility company. Alternatively, you can choose your own supplier using Apples to Apples offered through the Ohio Public Utilities Commission.

As we move closer to June, please monitor and familiarize yourself with the electric bill and your choices when it comes to suppliers.

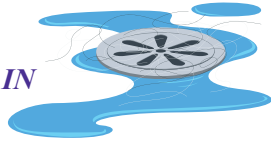
