Air Consumption Drills:

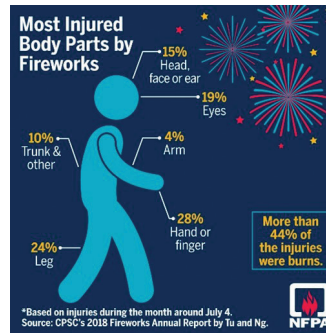
This air consumption drill with eight different work stations helps firefighters evaluate how long they can safely operate on air while working in hazardous environments.



Initial Fire Attack Drills:

As part of their training, new recruits must complete an initial fire attack drill that tests their ability to respond safely and effectively to a structure fire. This hands-on evaluation ensures they can deploy hose lines, work as a team, and operate under realistic emergency conditions.

SEASONAL SAFETY MESSAGE



Fireworks Safety:

Fireworks are often used to mark special events and holidays. The safest way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. It is important to know that fireworks are potentially not safe in the hands of consumers. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

National Fire Protection Association Statistics:

- More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- Sparklers account for roughly one quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

Pool and Swimming Safety:



Splashing, laughing, having fun, that's what water play is all about! But safety comes first. When kids are in or around water, adults need to stay close and stay focused. Skip the scrolling, save the texts, your full attention is the best way to keep them safe!

E-BIKE SAFETY

Electric bikes, or e-bikes, have become increasingly popular for commuting, recreation, and fitness, offering an efficient and eco-friendly way to travel. However, their higher speeds and faster acceleration, along with the battery and added weight compared to traditional bicycles,

introduce unique safety considerations and traffic laws. Riders of e-bikes must prioritize safety and adherence to traffic laws to prevent accidents and injuries.

In the State of Ohio, under Ohio Revised Code 4511.522, e-bikes are classified into (3) different classes. The class of your e-bike will be on a label affixed in a prominent location. This label will also indicate the top assisted speed the e-bike is capable of reaching and the motor wattage of the e-bike.

Class 1: The e-bike will pedal-assist up to 20mph. These e-bikes are permitted to operate on bicycle paths and shared-use paths.

Class 2: The e-bike will throttle-assist, meaning you don't have to pedal to get a boost, up to 20mph. These e-bikes are also permitted to operate on bicycle paths and shared-use paths.

Class 3: The e-bike will pedal-assist up to 28mph and is required to have a speedometer display. Class 3 e-bikes also carry additional restrictions compared to Class 1 and Class 2 e-bikes. Class 3 e-bikes require the rider to be at least (16) years old, the operator must wear a helmet, and the Class 3 e-bike is not permitted on bicycle paths or shared-use paths.

It is against Ohio law to modify an e-bike to exceed the speed of its designated class.

It is recommended as a key safety practice, regardless of the class of e-bike, that the rider wear a well-fitted helmet to prevent head injuries in the event of a fall or accident. Protective clothing such as gloves, sturdy shoes, and reflective or bright clothing improves visibility and guards against road rash. All e-bikes must be equipped with a red reflector and flashing rear light, as well as a white front light, for nighttime riding. When turning, unless the e-bike is equipped with turn signal lights, the rider should use hand signals to clearly indicate the direction of their turn. As with bicycles, while the e-bike rider is traveling on a public roadway, they must travel with the flow of traffic and obey all traffic laws, such as traffic signals and stop signs.

Before every ride, inspect your e-bike. Check the tire pressure, brake function, battery connections, and ensure lights and reflectors are working, especially for nighttime riding. Maintain a safe speed appropriate for conditions, traffic, and your skill level. Consider taking an e-bike safety course or practicing in a low-traffic area to build confidence. By prioritizing safety and adhering to traffic laws, you can significantly reduce risks and enjoy safer, more enjoyable rides.

His efforts have resulted in the recovery of significant funds for Jackson Township residents who have fallen victim to financial crimes. In addition, he regularly collaborates with law enforcement agencies across multiple counties, providing valuable expertise and support to fellow investigators.

Sgt. Aynes' commitment to excellence, his investigative expertise, and his service to both the department and the community are just a few of the many reasons he has earned this promotion.

VETERAN OFFICER GARY FRASCONO TO RETIRE AFTER DISTINGUISHED CAREER IN LAW ENFORCEMENT

After more than three decades of public service, Officer Gary Frascone will retire on April 20, 2026, concluding a long and decorated career in both military and law enforcement service.

Frascone began his career by enlisting in the United States Navy in 1991. During his time in the Navy, he completed three total deployments, including two to Europe and one to the Middle East. His deployment included naval support of Operation Provide Promise and Operation Sharp Guard during the Bosnian Wars, as well as counter-drug missions in South America alongside the United States Coast Guard and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). He was honorably discharged and transitioned into law enforcement in 1994.

On October 10, 1995, Frascone was commissioned as a patrol officer with the Dalton Police Department in Wayne County. During his tenure, he also served with the MedWay Drug Enforcement Agency, gaining early experience in narcotics enforcement.

Frascone later joined the Navarre Police Department, where he steadily rose through the ranks. He served as a Field Training Officer and Detective before being promoted to Sergeant in 2002. Just one year later, in 2003, he was promoted to the rank of Captain. During his time with Navarre, Frascone also took over and expanded the department's D.A.R.E. program within the Fairless Local School District, strengthening community outreach and youth education efforts.

In August 2007, seeking continued professional growth, Frascone joined the Jackson Township Police Department as a patrol officer. He quickly became a Field Training Officer and, in 2012, was assigned to the department's Detective Bureau. There, he handled some of the most challenging and sensitive cases, including investigations involving child abuse and neglect, sexual assault, and human trafficking. In addition to his departmental responsibilities, Frascone served as a Task Force Officer with the FBI's Child Exploitation Task Force and the Ohio Attorney General's Human Trafficking Task Force, contributing to efforts that extended beyond his local jurisdiction.

In January 2018, Frascone returned to the patrol division, where he continued to serve as a Field Training Officer and instructor, mentoring new officers and helping shape the future of the department. Over the course of his career, Frascone accumulated nearly 31 years of combined law enforcement experience, including 19 years of service to the residents of Jackson Township.

As he prepares to retire, colleagues and community members alike recognize Officer Frascone for his dedication, leadership, and commitment to protecting others that leave behind a legacy of service that will endure for years to come. Thank you for your service and dedication, you will be greatly missed!

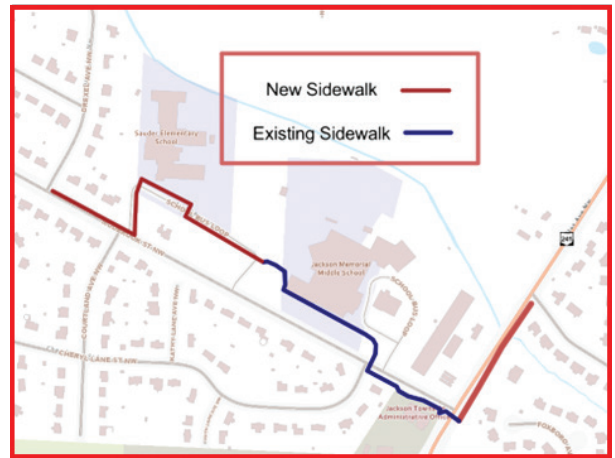

CONNECTIVITY FROM HOME TO SCHOOL

We're excited to share that Jackson Local School District and the Township were awarded 100% funding through the Ohio Department of Transportation Safe Routes to School Program back in 2021 - and now, this long-awaited project is officially underway!

This project will create new sidewalks connecting the Greenbriar Hills Allotment to both Jackson Memorial Middle School and Sauder Elementary School, making it safer and easier for students and families to walk or bike to school.



The main path will begin at Ponteberry Street NW and run south along Wales Avenue (SR-241) to Mudbrook Street. From there, it will tie into the middle school's recently updated sidewalks, which also connect directly to Sauder Elementary. On the west side, the project will also link Drexel Avenue into Sauder Elementary, offering another convenient route.

What makes this project especially meaningful is how it started - with an idea from one of our residents. Through collaboration between the Township, the School District, and our project partners, that idea is now becoming a reality. A special thank you goes out to CivPro Engineering for their hard work in designing and helping move this project forward for our community.

We look forward to seeing the positive impact this will have for years to come!

COMMUNITY CELEBRATION ROAD CLOSURES:

Fulton Drive, N.W., between Wales Rd (State Route 241) and Cliff Ave., will close to both eastbound and westbound traffic daily commencing:

**Monday, June 22, 2026, at 12:00 a.m.,
through Sunday, June 28, 2026 at 11:00 p.m.**

Those seeking to park at Jackson High School may enter through Caritas Circle N.W., or at the high school's entrance adjacent to the old school house, (*special access from Fulton Drive and Cliff Ave will be provided*).

On Friday, June 26, 2026, the Community Celebration will require the closing of the Township roads to accommodate the 5K run. The road closures could last up to (1) hour.

1. Mudbrook Street from Wales to Drexel Ave beginning at 8:30 p.m. The remainder of the roads listed below will close at 9:00 p.m.
2. Courtland Avenue from Mudbrook Avenue to Cheryl Lane Street.
3. Cheryl Lane Street from Courtland to Cranford Street.
4. Courtland Avenue south of Cheryl Lane Street.
5. Ruth Lane Avenue south of Cheryl Lane Street.
6. Cranford Street from Cheryl Lane Street to Vantage Hill Avenue.

11. Old Bridge Street from Greenwich Boulevard to Abington Street.
12. Abington Street from Old Bridge Street to Arlington Avenue (to Windy Lane Street).
13. Windy Lane Street from Arlington Avenue to Windward Trace Circle.
14. No access from Cliff Avenue until all runners have passed this point.
15. Windward Trace Circle to the 7800 Block, until all runners have entered the park.

KEEPING OUR COMMUNITY CLEAN: REMOVING JUNK MOTOR VEHICLES

Maintaining safe, clean, and attractive neighborhoods is a shared responsibility - and one important part of that effort is addressing junk motor vehicles on private property.

Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 505.871, townships in Ohio have the authority to remove vehicles that meet the legal definition of a “junk motor vehicle.” These are typically vehicles that are inoperable, extensively damaged, or otherwise unfit for use.

What Property Owners Should Know

If a junk motor vehicle is located on your property, Jackson Township cannot immediately remove it without notice. Instead, the law requires a fair process:

- Property owners will receive written notice identifying the vehicle and stating that it has been determined to be a junk motor vehicle.
- The notice provides at least fourteen (14) days to remove the vehicle voluntarily.
- If the vehicle is not removed within that timeframe, Jackson Township may arrange for its removal.

Costs and Liens

If Jackson Township must step in to remove the vehicle, the costs associated with removal may be:

- Charged to the property owner, and
- Placed on the property as a lien through the tax duplicate if unpaid.

This means that addressing the issue promptly can help avoid additional expenses.

Why This Matters

Junk vehicles can create a number of concerns, including:

- Safety hazards.
- Environmental risks (such as leaking fluids).
- Negative impacts on neighborhood appearance and property values.

By working together to address these issues, residents help preserve the quality of life in our community.

How to Stay in Compliance

If you have a vehicle on your property that is not currently in use:

- Ensure it is properly stored, maintained, or enclosed in a garage.
- Consider selling, repairing, or disposing of vehicles that are no longer operable.
- Respond promptly to any official notices from Jackson Township Zoning.

Zoning Resolution Updates – Effective May 2026

The Jackson Township Trustees approved several miscellaneous text amendments to the zoning resolution in April, which officially took effect in May 2026. These updates are intended to clarify existing regulations and address evolving development needs within the township.

Key amendments include:

- Agricultural animals and agritourism are prohibited on lots or parcels of two (2) acres or less.
- R-3 Planned Unit Development (PUD) District locations and housing opportunities.
- Temporary signs in residential districts.
- Public hearing notifications.
- Accessory buildings, structures, motor vehicles, boats, recreational vehicles, campers, and tents may not be used as living quarters.
- New definitions for Single-Family Attached Condos and Single-Family Attached Units on Fee Simple Subdivided Lots, along with minor updates to the definition of a Two-Family Dwelling.

New Housing Opportunities in R-3 Districts:

Recognizing the need for diverse housing options, the township has updated the R-3 Residential Planned Unit Development District to allow for attached units on fee simple, individually subdivided lots.

Application Fee for Zoning Permits

An application fee, as determined by the Trustees, is required for most zoning applications. This non-refundable fee must be paid at the time of submission for an application to be processed. If the application is approved, the fee will be credited toward the total permit cost. Any remaining balance must be paid within six (6) months of the approval date; otherwise, the permit will not be issued, and the approval will become void.

Application fees are intended to cover administrative and review costs and will not be refunded, regardless of whether an application is approved, denied, withdrawn, or found to be noncompliant with zoning regulations. Applicants are strongly encouraged to review all applicable zoning requirements prior to submission.

If an application is incomplete or contains minor deficiencies affecting compliance, the applicant may revise the application and site plan to meet zoning requirements.

Each attached building may include up to four units. Importantly, each unit is located on its own lot, with a zero-foot setback at the point of attachment. This arrangement allows homeowners to own both their unit and the land beneath it, as well as additional yard space.

Additional Information:

All public and private streets for attached units on fee simple individual subdivided lots shall be constructed in accordance with Stark County Subdivision Regulations.

Specific regulations for the R-3 Residential Planned Unit Development District are available in Section 401.19 of the zoning resolution.

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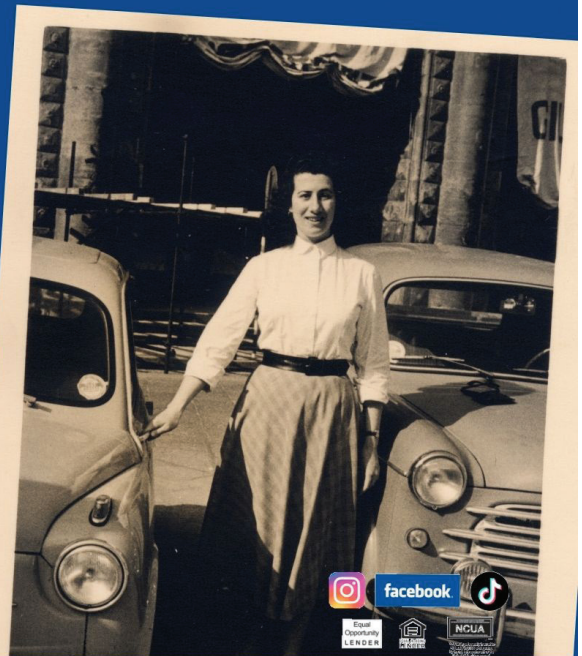

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Summer Stormwater - TIPS

Now that summer is officially here, and the kids are out of school, outdoor activities such as swimming, fishing, car washing and lawn care are a part of our everyday activities. All of these activities have one central thing in common: they impact our waterways in Jackson Township.

Protect Our Waterways

In an effort to protect our valuable waterways that become summer recreation sources during hot weather and the organisms and fish that live in them, the Township would like to provide some tips to residents for controlling water pollution from stormwater discharges:

- Do not dump anything in the storm sewer, such as antifreeze, cleaning supplies, motor oil, paint, etc.
- Do not use excessive amounts of pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers on your lawn.
- If you live adjacent to a waterway, do not mow up to the ditch or stream bank; leave a tall grass buffer to minimize runoff and erosion.
- Install a rain garden to minimize runoff and treat stormwater with attractive native plants.
- Make sure no chlorine is present in pool or spa water before draining the structure. Discharge the water slowly over an open grassy area, not into a stream or storm sewer system.
- Pick up after your pet; pet waste contributes significant amounts of bacteria to our waterways. Dispose of pet waste in the trash.
- Pick up litter to keep our storm sewers and waterways clean.
- Reuse stormwater by collecting it in rain barrels to water plants later.
- Stormwater runoff is most effectively controlled by slowing the water down and allowing it to infiltrate back into the ground slowly. Install pervious pavement, such as paving blocks, grid pavers, pervious concrete or pervious asphalt so water will infiltrate and not immediately run off.
- Take care to absorb spilled fluids from auto maintenance using absorbent towels or kitty litter. Dispose of these items in the trash.
- Wash your car on the lawn or take it to a commercial car wash to minimize pollutant runoff.

Jackson Center School: Preserving Our Educational Heritage

The Jackson Center School is the last remaining one-room schoolhouse in Jackson open to the public. Once one of at least a dozen schools built to educate local children, it now offers visitors a glimpse into a vastly different era of education. Stepping through its doors feels like traveling back in time—into a classroom far removed from today’s modern schools.

Here are a few facts you may not know:

- The school was originally located on Wales Avenue, across from the township hall. In 2000, the building was relocated to its current site.
- The existing brick structure was the third schoolhouse built at that location. According to *The History of Stark County*, the first school, constructed in 1816, was a small building made of round, untrimmed logs. It was used only until 1820 before being abandoned. A second schoolhouse was built in 1824, and the final brick building followed in the late 1860s.

- A single teacher instructed students in grades one through eight - all in the same room.
- The school originally had no running water, electricity, or indoor restrooms - amenities that have since been added.
- Over the years, the building has served a variety of purposes and was even altered to house businesses, including a gas station.
- After the 1930 school year, one-room schoolhouses were closed, as all local schools were consolidated into a single building, and grades nine through twelve were introduced.
- Today, the Jackson Center School is maintained by the Jackson Township Historical Society, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization.
- Financially, the Historical Society is supported by donations, memberships, and admission fees. It receives no funding from the township or county.
- It operates through the dedication of volunteers and trustees, with no paid staff.

As we celebrate America 250, it is the perfect time to visit local historic landmarks like the Jackson Center School - places that help tell the story of daily life in America since 1776.

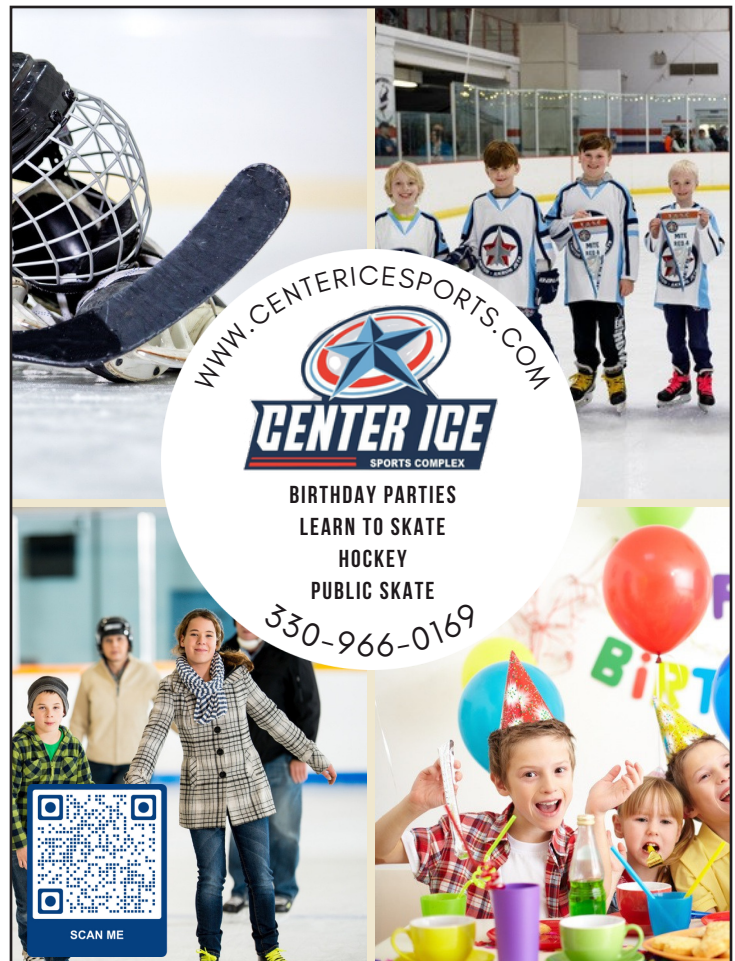

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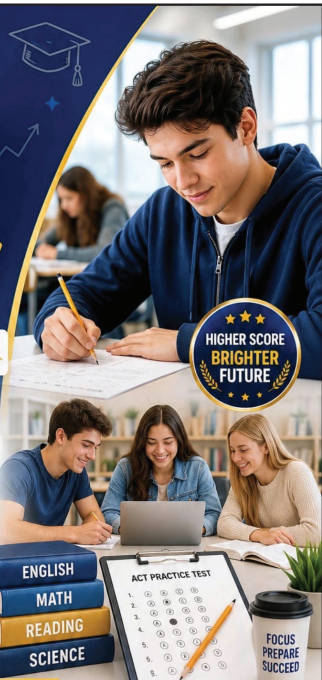


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
